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The Museum of Me

Introduction by Helena Tomlin, Curator of Learning

On Thursday 5th February 2009 St James' CE in Birch-in-Rusholme held an amazing and life-enhancing exhibition: The Museum of Me. The research project aimed to discover how Year 5 children could develop their understanding of archaeology. The Manchester Museum's temporary exhibition, 'Lindow Man: A Bog Body Mystery', was used as a starting point. The children worked with two artists, Daksha Patel and Paul Pickford, to explore, in depth, notions of time and identity. Making The Museum of Me also involved working with curators at the Museum to explore display and conservation themes.

Year 5's journals, installations and poetry will form a vitally important body of evidence to help the team at The Manchester Museum develop new ideas for the redisplay of the archaeology galleries.

Principles of Learning

The project aimed to work within the 6 'Principles of Learning' developed by the Learning Team at the Manchester Museum.

Each of these principles forms a chapter heading for the images that follow. These principles include learning collaboratively, encouraging freedom of choice and developing a multi-sensory, imaginative approach to engage children in their learning.






